### Area 5: Experiential Learning

Experiential learning projects are educational opportunities that occur outside of the confines of a traditional classroom. These projects must include work related to the issues of diversity and community engagement. A student will receive three credit hours for an experiential learning provided they fulfill all of the requirements.

Examples of experiential learning project are, but may not necessarily include the following examples:

- Service learning
- Volunteer projects
- Internships related to diversity or community work
- Undergraduate research projects
- Conflict resolution programs

Experiential Learning Projects will receive credit hours under SOC 4964: Field Study. The minor director must approve all experiential learning projects. Please refer to the Experiential Learning Project Handbook for guidelines and procedures.
